

**MINUTES – REGULAR MEETING
BOONE TOWN COUNCIL
March 8, 2023**

CALL TO ORDER - 12:00 P.M.

A regular meeting of the Boone Town Council was called to order at 12:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers located at 1500 Blowing Rock Road in Boone. Mayor Tim Futrelle presided. Council members present included Mayor Pro-Tem Edie Tugman, Councilmember Todd Carter, Councilmember Virginia Roseman, Councilmember Dalton George and Councilmember Becca Nenow. Staff present included Town Manager Amy Davis, Communications Specialist Laney Pilkington, Public Works Director Rick Miller, Public Works Deputy Director Todd Moody, Public Utilities Deputy Director Josh Eller, Planning Director Jane Shook, Grants Coordinator Michelle Brown, Cultural Resources Director Mark Shook, Downtown Boone Development Coordinator Paige Henderson, Finance Director Guy Miller, Police Chief Andy Le Beau, Fire Chief Jimmy Isaacs, and Sustainability and Special Projects Manager George Santucci. Human Resource Director Dale Presnell and Planning and Inspections Deputy Director Stacey Miller attended remotely. Town Attorney Allison Meade was also present.

MOMENT OF SILENCE

PUBLIC COMMENT - 12:00 P.M.

TENTATIVE AGENDA ADOPTION

Mayor Pro-Tem Tugman asked to make a motion to move Closed Session, proposed for the end of the agenda, to be held after Council Matters. Upon the motion by Councilmember Roseman, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Tugman, Council voted unanimously to amend the agenda to move Closed Session to the end of Council Matters. Upon the motion by Councilmember George, seconded by Councilmember Carter, Council voted unanimously to approve the amended agenda as presented.

WORK SESSION - 12:00 P.M.

Ms. Davis began by discussing the addition of the “no left turn” sign at the intersection of Martin Luther King Jr. Street and State Farm Road. She added that Watauga County Manager, Deron Geoque, had mentioned he would be willing to move the traffic signal. However, Chief Isaac raised safety concerns with the proposed move of the traffic light, due to the location of Fire Station 2. Mayor Futrelle asked about a possible right hand turn lane off of Martin Luther King Jr. Street. Mr. Rick Miller said that it was possible, but easements would be required and utilities would need to be moved. Mr. Miller then proposed a concrete island at the entrance of Martin Luther King Jr. Street, which

would require vehicles to only turn right out of the aforementioned street. Council agreed that the proposed island could work. Chief LeBeau added that currently, the “no left turn” sign has reduced the wait time on Martin Luther King Jr. Street substantially, and Ms. Davis agreed and noted that many residents in the neighborhoods above had thanked the town for the sign. Discussion ensued in regards to a potential traffic impact analysis from the County for the location. Before any action is taken, Mr. Miller asked to allow town staff to reach out to the media, as well as the neighborhoods above, for a public input session for the proposed project. Council agreed.

Mayor Pro-tem Tugman mentioned that the Cultural Resources Advisory Board (CRAB) had completed the final draft of the 1872 award. Mr. Freed added that the board felt that they would be able to have the application for the award live in the coming weeks. Applications would be collected through April, with the winner of the award being honored at either Boonerang or as the Grand Marshal of the July parade. Councilmember George expressed appreciation to the board and to the Cultural Resources Department for the work they have done in regards to the 1872 award. Mayor Pro Tem-Tugman then asked to amend the agenda to approve the proposed award and have staff begin the process of soliciting applications.

Councilmember George moved to adopt and implement the proposed award process. Upon the motion by Councilmember George, seconded by Councilmember Roseman, the process and implementation of the 1872 Award was approved unanimously.

Councilmember George proposed discussing a municipal service district (MSD) in the Blowing Rock Road area. He explained that the taxes received had to be used for certain items, and these items could include stream restoration, adding green space, and making the corridor more multimodal friendly. Councilmember Todd agreed that it was a good idea, and added that it would be a way to generate revenue and encompasses this Council’s goals for that corridor. Councilmember Roseman asked how long the proposed MSD would be. Councilmember George answered that he would like to see it range from the Convocation Center to Walgreens. Councilmember added that more research would need to be done. Discussion ensued in regards to potential tax rate for the MSD. Mayor Futrelle directed staff to move forwards with further research and to deliver a report. Discussion ensued regarding “car centric” businesses and past discussions on the NCDOT 105 Highway Extension project. Ms. Shook reminded Council that Boone is the county seat for Watauga County, and that many people travel to Boone for medical appointments and other necessary activities. Ms. Meade suggested that Council would want to consider whether restrictions in the Blowing Rock Road would result in pushing "car-centric" developments to other areas of Boone, such as the 105 and 421 east corridors. Mayor Pro-Tem Tugman asked if there could be further review within the zoning categories. Ms. Shook agreed it was possible. With no further discussion on this topic, Mayor Pro-Tem Tugman gave a quick recap of her meeting with the Children’s Council. She encouraged Council to support the Children’s Council in their programming. Councilmember Roseman asked Ms. Davis about the proposed childcare facility in Blowing Rock for Town of Blowing Rock staff. Ms. Davis answered that she had discussed with Blowing Rock Town Manager Shane Fox, and that if the childcare facility came to fruition, they would discuss further about partnering with Blowing Rock to allow Boone Town staff to bring their children to the center, space allowing.

Mayor Futrelle asked if there was any further discussion. Mr. Moody brought to Council that the Pinnacle Self Storage facility is building a road between Chestnut Drive and New Market Boulevard, and would like to dedicate the road to the town. Within the Town Code, it is noted that all streets given to the town to maintain need to go to Council for naming. Mr. Moody said the proposed name is Norman Cheek Avenue, after the late prominent business owner in Boone and owner of the property, Norman Cheek. Councilmember George discussed the possibility of inviting the family of the late Norman Cheek to the next Town Council meeting in order to discuss the renaming with them. Mr. Moody told Council that until the roadAfter further discussion, Councilmember Roseman made the motion to rename the street Cheek Avenue. Upon the motion made by Councilmember Roseman, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Tugman, the renaming of the road Norman Cheeks Drive to Cheeks Drive was approved three to two, with Councilmember Carter, Councilmember Roseman and Mayor Pro-Tem Tugman voting in favor, and Councilmember George and Councilmember Nenow voting against.

Councilmember Nenow asked for Council to remove the task of researching communities with plastic bans from Mr. Santucci due to other projects he is working on. Council agreed. With no further discussion, Mayor Futrelle called

for a break at 1:45pm.

PUBLIC COMMENT 2:00 P.M.

Mayor Futrelle resumed the meeting at 2:03pm. He then opened the floor for public comment. Nathan Godwin of Boone expressed his support for the skatepark located at the Greenway and asked for Council to consider approving the funding Mr. JP Pardy will be asking for during the requested appearances portion of the meeting.

Leslie Cuthbert spoke next and gave her support for the skatepark as well. She noted that it is a community, and that she is proud that her sons are able to skate in Boone. She added that the skatepark is a place for individuals to express themselves.

Henry Cuthbert spoke to Council about how the skatepark is an important part of his snowboarding career, and how he has been able to learn technical tricks with the help of his skateboarding community.

Justice Hendley noted his support of the skatepark, and mentioned how grateful he is to be able to enjoy it. He added how he was able to meet many people and make friends there, and that the skatepark is an amazing thing.

Eric Montoya spoke to Council about how skateparks are a good way to bring people to Boone. Additionally, he added that the skatepark currently at the Greenway is too small for users and that the expansion, which will be proposed during the request appearances portion of the meeting, would help create a safer environment.

Ashley Galleher gave a brief backstory of her time in the skateboarding world, and how she believed that skateboarding is a great avenue for youths to express themselves. She added that skateboarding is built around goal building, and if Council approved the total amount of funding asked for, it would be a great example of completing a goal the community set together.

Mayor Futrelle asked if there were others in the audience that would like to provide public comment. With no other audience members wanting to provide public comment, Mayor Futrelle read the following comments submitted by email:

Walker Stutts: I've been living and skating her for 13 years, and the first phase of the skatepark is by far the best and biggest step the town has taken in creating a more open community for skaters. Before the first phase was built in November of 2021, finding somewhere to skate in the Town of Boone was definitely a challenge. Skaters have had to seek out other options including skating in the streets and traveling out of town. Seeing the amount of people that visit the park daily (as amazing as it is) it does show that we are in need of more space to cater to our community's skateboarding demand. However, the amount of camaraderie and respect I see from skaters young and old at the skatepark goes to show how much it means to all of us, as well as anyone who visits in the future. Finishing the skatepark and bringing it to its full potential will be a wonderful addition to our community. Thank you for your time and please help us out in finishing the expansion!

Ken Connelly: I am 65 years old, a resident of Boone, and have enjoyed skateboarding for the past 45 years. I am commenting on the proposed expansion on the skatepark. I would love to see you invest in expanding the local park. The current configuration provides a decent workout- as long as it is not overcrowded- but it is very limited in the size and features. Overcrowding, which generally occurs anytime the public schools are out and the weather is nice, makes the park of very little use. I can assure you from my own personal experience that skateboarding is a "destination sport" that effects the travel and vacation plans of quite a few of us avid skaters. For the past 20 years, I have chosen most of my vacations and trips based on the skateparks in the destination communities I have visited. Since moving to Boone in 2014 to be near out grandchildren, I have been travelling several times a month to towns with quality parks: Morganton, Greensboro, Asheville, Hendersonville, Lexington, and recently Mooresville. I was delighted to see Boone add our park last year, and am very anxious to see it completed to the design published by the committee. Our unique cool summer weather is extremely important to skaters and would make this the ideal

location for a world-class park. I believe that your investment in the park will help to place Boone on the map of quality skatepark destinations.

With no further comment, Mayor Futrelle closed public comment and thanked those in attendance.

REQUESTED APPEARANCES

JP PARDY - RECESS SKATE AND SNOW

Mr. John Paul (JP) Pardy introduced himself as the owner of Recess Skate and Snow, and as the coordinator for the Boone Skatepark project. After a brief overview of the funding process for the previous phase of the Boone Skatepark, which opened in November 2021, Mr. Pardy asked the Council for additional funding for the skatepark. Mr. Pardy explained that through fundraising, the skatepark has reach \$40,000 for Phase 2 of the project. Phase 2 will include a “street” section, a large bowl for skaters, and a covered viewing area for patrons of the park and family members of skaters. Mr. Pardy asked the Council for \$25,000, and for an additional \$70,000 from the excess TDA fund. With the combined \$95,000, in additional to the \$40,000 raised by the community, Mr. Pardy explained that he will apply for a grant through the North Carolina Department of Parks and Recreation for a match grant for the total amount of money contributed to the skatepark. He explained further that the grant would match whatever funding is raised for the skatepark, explaining that if granted in total the \$95,000 with the \$40,000 funded from the community, the grant would match the potential \$135,000 raised, with the project funding totally \$270,000. Chief LeBeau added that since the skatepark has opened, no problems have been reported and that it is a valuable resource, which keeps skaters off private property. Councilmember George said that he appreciates the time and dedication Mr. Pardy and the skating community put into this project and voiced his support for the funding. Councilmember Carter asked how much expansion could be done after the proposed Phase 2 expansion, in which Mr. Pardy replied that they could expanded by roughly 2,000 square feet afterwards. Councilmember Roseman asked Ms. Davis and Mr. Miller if they had the funds to committed \$25,000. Ms. Davis said that they did, and that they could commit \$70,000 from the TDA excess as well. Mayor Pro-Tem Tugman expressed concern over the \$70,000, stating that she was worried the amphitheater at Horn in the West may not receive grant funding. Councilmember Roseman agreed. Councilmember George reminded Council that whatever funds committed by the Town would be used for the match grant, and that right now the community has shown a commitment to the skatepark and the Mr. Pardy has done his due diligence in regards to fundraising. Ms. Brown added that the deadline for the review for the grant for the skatepark is due at the end of the following week.

Upon a motion by Councilmember, seconded by Councilmember George, Council voted unanimously for Mr. Miller to present a budget amendment for \$25,000, as well as a budget amended for \$70,000 out of the TDA excess for Phase 2 of the skatepark expansion, contingent upon receiving the grant for the North Carolina Parks and Recreation Department.

RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT THE NO-MOW INITIATIVE 2023

WHEREAS, the Boone Town Council recognizes that bees and other pollinators are integral to pollination of plants in order to grow a wide diversity of essential foods, including fruit, nuts, and vegetables;
WHEREAS, pollinator populations are threatened due to habitat loss, neonicotinoid use, pathogens, and parasites;
WHEREAS, recent research suggests that bee pollinators make use of no-mow spaces as key floral resources during early spring in the Midwest United States;

WHEREAS, pollinators and floral resources have a positive relationship, where the increase in pollinators can increase the amount of flora and vice-versa; and

WHEREAS, the Boone Town Council finds it is in the public interest and is consistent with Town policy for the Town to demonstrate its commitment to a safe and healthy community environment through the implementation of initiatives that help increase the pollinator population;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Boone Town Council declares No-Mow May and encourages property owners to refrain from mowing the open spaces on their properties on the date of this resolution until May 31, 2023.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Boone Town Council directs the Town Manager and staff to communicate the benefits of the reduced frequency of lawn mowing, particularly during the early spring growing season.

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\$2,000.00 was deposited into Miscellaneous Revenue for the Commemorative Program for Mr. Doc Dockery and Mr. Jeffery Carter, \$1,000.00, respectively. \$500.00 was authorized from Greenway Maintenance to purchase the bronze plaques for the benches. \$500.00 is being requested to be transferred back to Greenway Maintenance. Documentation is attached.

Mayor Futrelle asked if there was any discussion to be had in regards to the consent agenda. Councilmember George gave a brief overview about the importance of the National Fair Housing Month resolution and the importance on the local ecosystems for the No-Mow May resolution. Councilmember Roseman reminded Council of the marker ceremony for the Hayes/Bryan/Greene Cemetery would be held on June 2nd. Additionally, Councilmember Roseman asked Ms. Henderson if the proposed mural of Doc and Merle Watson would be completed by that time. Ms. Henderson stated that the mural is moving forward on a conditional basis, with the condition being an updated proposal has to be sent to Ms. Henderson and the Historic Preservation Commission. She added that the updated proposal will be completed shortly, and that approval for the mural is pending the updated proposal. Mayor Futrelle recognized National Women's Day. With no further discussion, the Council moved to the next agenda item.

COUNCIL MATTERS**TOWN MANAGER UPDATE**

Ms. Davis informed Council that Ms. Brown and Mr. Moody had worked together and had received a grant for a multimodal feasibility assessment. Additionally, Mr. Santucci had received a stormwater improvement grant. Mr. Eller had worked with the High Country Council of Governments and had received two grants for water and sewer. Ms. Davis then asked Chief LeBeau to give a brief update. Chief LeBeau explained that the previous Thursday night was the last night of the Citizen's Academy. Detective Lyall received an Advanced Law Enforcement certificate. Finally, Chief LeBeau explained that he had been chosen by the Governor to serve on the Law Enforcement Advisory Group for Racial Equity in Criminal Justice. Ms. Davis then went on to say that the Public Works Department had completed the installation of LED lights on all town-owned light poles. With the help of Mr. Chris Miller, the town had mapped all the poles and fixtures. With the conversion to all LEDs, the Town of Boone is estimated to save roughly \$5,400 a month in electricity. Ms. Davis then announced that

on April 22nd, the Town of Boone will be hosting a Boone Clean Up day. With no further comment, Mayor Futrelle asked Ms. Meade to give an attorney update.

TOWN ATTORNEY UPDATE

Ms. Meade informed Council that she did not have an attorney update to give.

BOARD LIAISON REPORT

Mayor Futrelle asked for a board liaison report. Councilmember Carter did not have a report. Councilmember George did not have a report. Councilmember Nenow updated Council on the work of the Sustainability Committee. She stated that many events would be happening at Appalachian State University and in the Town of Boone during Earth Week, which is the week of April 16th. She also updated Council on the work of the Downtown Boone Development Association. She stated that this upcoming year, the Downtown Boone Development Association would not be up for reaccreditation because the association does not have diverse funding sources, like fundraising. Councilmember Roseman updated Council on the Human Relations Commission, stating that they Commission had a guest speaker from the State Human Relations Commission come speak at their meeting. Councilmember Carter added that the Commission currently has seats that need to be filled, and asked for community members to apply. Councilmember Roseman then updated Council on the work of the Historic Preservation Commission, stating that at the Commission will be coming before Council to request \$7,700 for signs in the near future. Mayor-Pro Tem Tugman updated Council on the Cultural Resources Advisory Board, adding from the previous discussion regarding the 1872 Award that Mr. Freed will be giving tours of the Rivers Park and Daniel Boone Park for members of the Board. Additionally, Mayor Pro-Tem Tugman reminded Council of the Boonerang schedule and asked the community to volunteer. With no further discussion, Mayor Futrelle moved to the next agenda item.

CONSIDERATION OF HOWARD STREET MARKET

Ms. Hannah Dick gave a brief overview of the Howard Street Market, and asked for Council to consider waiving the \$1,500 fee required by the Town Code. Councilmember George asked if the Town had waived the fee in the past. Ms. Davis said that yes, previous Town Councils had waived the fee for nonprofits. Ms. Dick added that this market would help bring attention to the businesses on Howard Street. Ms. Meade asked if the event was brought to the Downtown Boone Development Association. Ms. Henderson, the Downtown Development Coordinator, said she had not spoken with Davis Parker from DRABA, the coordinator of the event. After a brief discussion in regards to street closures, Councilmember George asked that if approved that business owners on Howard Street be informed beforehand. Mayor Pro-Tem Tugman explained that she did not feel that the application was complete, due to the fact that no cleaning plan was in place. Councilmember Carter agreed, and asked said that he would like a similar event to go forward in conjunction with the Downtown Boone Development Association. Ms. Dick asked Council if she could ask Davis Parker to reach out to the Downtown Development Coordinator and discuss a consultation with the Downtown Boone Development Association. Council agreed unanimously, and moved to the next item.

CONSIDERATION OF RAFTELIS FINANCIAL CONSULTANTS INC. WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM RATE AND FEE STUDY- REVIEW AND UPDATE, PROPOSAL AND CONTRACT

Mr. Eller gave a brief overview of the proposed Water and Sewer Rate and Fee study proposal and contract. He explained that a new state-authorized system development fee for water and sewer was adopted in 2018, and that the system development fee would need to be updated at least every five years. Mr. Eller added that three proposals were submitted, and that Raftelis was selected due to their history with the Town of Boone, their qualifications, and their proposed terms. Additionally, their proposal was the middle proposal in price. He added that all fees for the study were covered by a water and sewer grant. Upon a motion by Councilmember Carter, seconded by Councilmember George, Council voted unanimously to approve the contract for the water and sewer rate and fee study.

REQUEST TO SCHEDULE FINAL BUDGET WORKSHOP DATES

After a brief conversation, Council unanimously voted to hold the Budget Workshops on May 18th at 9:00am and June 5th at 9:00am.

APPOINTMENT TO BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

After reviewing the application for the Board of Adjustment, Councilmember George asked Ms. Shook to reach out to the applicant in regards to the Board of Adjustment in order to allow the applicant time to reconsider their application. Council voted unanimously to table the application for the Board of Adjustment.

APPOINTMENT TO HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSION

Upon the motion of Councilmember Roseman, seconded by Councilmember Carter, Council unanimously voted to appoint Joan Brook to the Human Relations Commission. Councilmember Roseman added that she would bring the voice and representation of the Judaic community to the commission.

PLANNING MATTERS

Mayor Futrelle asked if Council would agree to move to closed session at the end of Planning Matters. Council unanimously consented to moving closed session to the end of Planning Matters. Mayor Futrelle thanked Council, and then asked Ms. Shook for an update. Ms. Shook thanked Council, and gave a brief update on Planning Matters. She stated that the next stakeholder meeting for the comprehensive plan will be held on April 4th, with the focus of that meeting to talk with local developers and discuss workforce housing. Councilmember George recommend Ms. Shook to reach out to JB Birch and Sara Crouch from OASIS, due to her experience with transitional housing. Discussion ensued in regards to Salisbury's land use plan. Councilmember Roseman added that she felt it would be good if someone from the Salisbury community came to present, in which Ms. Shook agreed. With no further discussion, Mayor Pro-Tem asked for a motion to enter into closed session.

CLOSED SESSION

Upon the motion made by Councilmember George to enter into closed session, pursuant to the item that was listed in the agenda, seconded by Councilmember Roseman, the Boone Town Council entered into closed session at 4:28pm.

POSSIBLE ACTION FOLLOWING CLOSED SESSION

No action was taken during closed session.

PUBLIC COMMENT - 6:00 P.M.

Mayor Futrelle called the meeting back to order at 6:00pm. Mayor Futrelle then opened public comment. Councilmember Nenow asked if Council could move the work session portion of the meeting after council matters. Ms. Shook added that she believed that a previous discussion had planning matters after the 6pm public comment, due to the fact that the public may want to provide public comment on a planning matter. Discussion ensued. Ms. Pilkington asked for clarification for the minutes for the proposed new agenda order for Town Council meetings. Ms. Pilkington asked if the following order was correct: Public Comment at 12:00pm, Council Matters, Closed Session, Work Session, Public Comment at 6:00pm, then Planning Matters. With no further discussion, Mayor Futrelle asked for a motion to adjourn. Upon the motion by Councilmember George, seconded by Councilmember Nenow, Council voted unanimously to adjourn at 6:10pm.
